

Belt Rules

Article 1 – Belts and their corresponding ages

- White: for beginners of all ages.
 - Gray: optional, used for children 4 to 6 years old.
 - Yellow: used for children 7 to 15 years old.
 - Orange: used for children 10 to 15 years old.
 - Green: used for children 13 to 15 years old.
 - Blue: available for students at least 16 years and older.
 - Purple: available for students at least 17 and older.
 - Brown: available for students at least 18 years older.
 - Black: available for students at least 19 years old.
 - Black (Professor): available for black belts 21 years and older, only after they have held their black belt for 9 years, the equivalent to three stripes.
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- Red and Black (Master): available for black belts that have held their belts and continued teaching for at least 25 years.
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- Red (Grand Master): credit available for black belts that have held their belts and continued teaching for at least 50 years.

* Onto the track Brown, the teacher can use the criterion for graduating up to 4 degrees each track, before giving the next track, acknowledging the shortfall of CBJJE.

Article 2 – Titles of Honor and Graduation

- Achievement: for those who at some point, an event or other. Furthermore, if, on behalf of the recognition of an entity
- Benemérito: Masters and teachers, sports Deployer their promoters made in Jiu-Jitsu, included with this title of honor.
- Master: a title provided in recognition for an educator with more than 30 years in the sport.
- Grand Master: one who has dedicated themselves to Jiu -Jitsu, teaching for over 40 years; proven record in assisting in the development of students, athletes and citizens.
- Venerable Master: one who has been teaching for over 50 years; has worked intensely to advance the sport. An instructor who is also an IMPORTANT member of the Jiu-Jitsu community, as having created a legion of pupils and disciples that elevate the sport!

* To achieve such titles, one must belong to a committee of peers. A vote is taken to decide if the prospective recipient is worthy.

Article 3 – Hierarchy of Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu

I – Jiu-Jitsu, being a martial art, is organized as a hierarchy. All practitioners should respect the hierarchical standing inside and outside the mat.

II – Titles are recognize, downgrade, collapse or lifted by CBJJE as an entity; the Board and Directors, created for this purpose, is responsible for such decisions.

III – All securities shall be reviewed with caution and rigor, because most graduation representatives are those that the whole Jiu Jitsu community will view as examples to be followed. In the event of a death, the practitioner or teacher automatically will be honored and given a higher degree or title post humus!

IV – Maximum hierarchy of Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu

- Jiu-Jitsu was introduced to Brazil by Mitsuyo Octavio Maeda Koma-Count
- Patrons of Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu are the Brothers Gracie (Carlos, Oswaldo, George, Gastao and Helio Gracie)
- Beneméritos sports-all of those who have assisted in the deployment of the sport in the maintenance and development of this, having an orderly life to Jiu-Jitsu Graduation system CBJJ, CBJJE and BJJSF .

Respect the traditional Belt Structure; this is the same order developed and used in Brazil.

16 years and younger

White, yellow, orange and green

Stripes are given when deserved, in representation of the student's level within their current belt, up to 4 for each color belt.

16 years old and up

White, blue, purple brown

Stripes are given when deserved, in representation of the student's level within their current belt, up to 4 for each color belt.

Black Belts

19 years old and up

Should explain the different tips (white, red, red with white tips)

Stripes are given every 3 years

Black (should explain doesn't hold title of Professor until 3 stripes)

Professor and Master

Black (should explain, used from 3 to 6 stripes, how long it takes for each stripe)

Coral (should explain, used from 7 to 8 stripes, how many years of teaching experience necessary)

Red (should explain, used from 9 stripes on, how many years of teaching experience necessary)
